A Message from the Commissioners of St. Michaels

"Resilience" is the word as we move forward into 2023. The Commissioners of St. Michaels continue to focus on sustainable practices for future growth and stability.

First and foremost is holding back the tide of the inevitable impact of climate change and rising sea levels. The Town's Climate Change and Sea Level Rise Commission has successfully secured grant money to start evaluating and implementing projects to protect our Town from flooding levels projected for the year 2050 and beyond. The commission is seeking public participation to help map our strategy. More on their work sessions can be found on the Town website, www.stmichaelsmd.gov.

The Town has also received grant money for the initial engineering stage of extending the nature trail from Rail-road Avenue to the ball fields at Perry Cabin Park, which would double the trail's length to two miles.



The new electronic water meters are here, with installation scheduled in phases over the coming year. These meters replace antiquated mechanical meters. The electronic meters will record more accurate water usage levels, and will instantly alert our staff to leaks and other issues. The overall impact will save money and time, creating a more resilient and efficient operation.

The Commissioners will soon be tackling the 2023-24 budget with the aim of further shoring up the Town's finances. The goal is to keep the Town running at peak efficiency while maintaining the resources to fund sea level rise projects and the planned Town office/police station com-

plex. The budget work sessions are open to the public and we encourage your participation. Times and dates will be announced on our website and through Constant Contact messaging.

We have also added new professionals to our staff who will help us achieve our long-range goals of resilience and sustainability. Eric Knapp is our new Code Compliance Officer and Steve Ball is our new Planning and Zoning Officer. They bring many years of experience and accreditation to their respective jobs. We look forward to working with them to maintain the special historic character that has made St. Michaels a popular destination for tourists, full-time residents, and vacation homeowners.

2023 will also mark the end of an era with two significant retirements. Chief Anthony Smith has announced he'll be hanging up his uniform in June after 11 years of exemplary service as our Town's police chief. He leaves the department in the very capable hands of Capt. Jeff Oswald and our outstanding officers. Our Town Clerk Suzanna Warnick is also moving on to an exciting new chapter in her life. She has been the glue that, in many ways, has held this town together for the past 14 years. Please offer your thanks and congratulations to Suzanna and the Chief when you see them around town.

St. Michaels Pursues Sustainable Communities Designation

Town Seeks Community Input in the Coming Months

The Town will be asking for your input on an important planning study in the coming months. St. Michaels was first established by the State of Maryland as a "Sustainable Community" in 2013. This program qualifies the Town for potential state funded grants for reinvestment and revitalization. The application materials must be updated every five years and the current deadline for such is the end of this year. The update will include an analysis of the past activities and an action plan to increase vitality and livability in the community and set priority initiatives and projects for the next five years. The action plan requires the Town to set desired outcomes for various categories like the environment, economy, transportation, housing, quality of life, and land use. A variety of public facility projects will be identified as we proceed in each of these categories.



Citizen input will be solicited on the documents as we proceed. We will likely reach out to the community, in various ways, such as community workshops or surveys to help us set priorities for this program. Once these are established, the Town will look for State funding opportunities to carry out projects.

Tales from the Town Code

Permits Needed For a Variety of Projects

Eric Knapp, Special Project Manager/Code Compliance Officer, has been very busy his first few weeks on the job. Fortunately, Eric is well-versed in many aspects of code compliance and building construction review and will be a great resource for St. Michaels residents.

In Eric's short tenure with the Town, he has come across many issues including construction activities on neighbor's property, unknown lot lines, required setbacks not adhered to, dumpsters in not so convenient areas, and appropriate permits not obtained. To assist our residents, please contact Eric at 410-745-9535, before undertaking any large improvement project. Eric will be more than happy to assist you with the permitting process or answer any questions you may have.

Please feel free to view the entire Town Code online at the following link https://ecode360.com/ST1595 or view a printed copy of the document at the Town Office. Please note the following short list of important but, not so known code requirements.

§ 108-4 Permits required. It shall be unlawful for any person to construct or cause to be constructed any structure within the Town of St. Michaels without first obtaining a permit therefor approved by the St. Michaels Building Inspector.

2021 International Residential Code R105.1 Permits Required. Any owner or owner's authorized agent who intends to construct, enlarge, alter, repair, move, demolish or change the occupancy of a building or structure, or to erect, install, enlarge, alter, repair, remove, convert or replace any electrical, gas, mechanical or plumbing system, the installation of which is regulated by this code, or to cause any such work to be performed, shall first make application to the building official and obtain the required permit.

Town Awarded \$35,000 Nature Trail Grant

Grant to Study Feasibility and Design for Trail Extension

The Town of St. Michaels was recently awarded a \$35,000 DNR Grant for a Feasibility and Design Study to construct a 1.25-mile extension of the St. Michaels Nature Trail/Multi-Use Bikeway. The vision for this project was initiated by the St. Michaels Rotary Club, who helped build the original Nature Trail, which was completed in 2010.

"Rotary of St. Michaels was instrumental in the first St. Michaels Nature Trail project," stated Amanda Davis, President of the St. Michaels Rotary Club. "Since 2010, our community and visitors alike have used the paved nature trail for biking, walking, and inline skating. It is wheelchair accessible and there is access to the water for fishing, kayaking and paddleboarding. We are looking forward to exploring all the ways our Rotary Club can partner with the Town of St. Michaels to achieve the trail extension for this great community."

Project partners include the Commissioners of St. Michaels, the St. Michaels Planning Commission, Rauch Inc., Environmental Concern, and the Rotary Club of St. Michaels. The proposed multipurpose ADA compliant bikeway/pedestrian trail will connect the southeast side of Town (near the high school) to the northwest side of Town, terminating at Perry Cabin Park. The trail will provide a safer route for pedestrians and cyclists to bypass the downtown area, thereby avoiding the busy traffic on the main thoroughfare. It will also provide a safe alternative means to get to/from school events and the ballpark.

The Town has committed in-kind and matching-fund support with Environmental Concern donating in-kind services for the initial conceptual plan-

As illustrated in yellow on the attached map, the trail extension will connect with Bradley Park on Railroad Avenue and continue northward to Perry Cabin Park. Disruptions to private property are anticipated to be minimal as the trail will be located on State Highway Administration easements. Preliminary investigations including soil studies, wetland studies, and engineering studies will guide the design and engineering.


Once the Feasibility and Design Study are completed the Town and partnering agencies will seek funding from the FHA Transportation Alternative Plan to construct the trail extension.

St. Michaels Architectural History

HDC Preserves Town's Historical Charm

History is one of the many attractions that St. Michaels has for visitors and residents alike. We are, after all, "the Town that fooled the British." We not only have that story and other stories to tell, but we also have a remarkable concentration of residential and commercial buildings that witnessed these stories. These structures, and the history that they reflect, are protected in St. Michaels Historic District which is on the National Register of Historic Places. Several structures are also listed individually in the National Register; many more are listed in the Maryland Inventory of Historic Properties.

The Town established the St. Michaels Historic District Commission (HDC) to safeguard these sites that reflect the Town's cultural, social, political, and architectural history. The HDC meets each month to review plans for construction, additions, or any other alterations to the exteriors of structures or sites within the Historic District. The Zoning Code requires an approved Certificate of Appropriateness before any permits are issued or construction begins.

"Our mandate is historic preservation. However, we recognize that St. Michaels is a vibrant, living town and we work hard to balance our mandate for preservation with the expectations and requirements of 21st Century life," stated HDC Chairperson, James Fulton. "We also try to consider the effect that any proposed change will have on neighboring properties and the streetscape."

All the standards that the HDC uses in reviewing applications are contained in The St. Michaels Historic District Design Review Guide-lines. The Guidelines were updated in April 2021 and are based on best practices for historic preservation as described in The Secretary of the Interior's Standards for the Treatment of Historic Properties and numerous other historic districts around the country. This document is available from the Town website and is available for review by anyone who has an interest in the Historic District.

Both the Climate Change/Sea Level Rise and Town Commission are working diligently to mitigate flooding on low lying areas within our community. As these weather-related challenges are being addressed, the Town is also making public safety a critical priority during these extreme weather events. As mentioned in previous articles, flooding in St. Michaels is a major concern. Although hurricane season has officially ended, St. Michaels is still susceptible to severe snowstorms, tornadoes, high tides, heavy rain and flooding. It is well known that these storms and high waters continue to cause havoc on our small town. They have caused street closures, downed trees/electrical wires, damaged properties and resulted in several water rescues for those trying to travel on our flooded roadways. Fortunately, we can alleviate some of these risks.

Preparing for any hazard or disaster starts at home. Hurricane and winter seasons are the perfect time to ensure you have your emergency supply kits stocked, family evacuation plans set, and your home or business prepared. Knowing the hazards affecting your area from a severe weather event and receiving emergency alerts is a priority in preparation.
